

## Check Out Lucy's Lending Library

Lucy Rutherford Morris of Hingham and Scituate was a devout Christian pilgrim, an advocate for justice for the oppressed, and a lifelong avid reader. She passed away in March of 2019 at the age of 100. Through a generous donation from Lucy's family to Pastoral Counseling Services of the South Shore, Lucy's Lending Library has come into being.

Lucy's Lending Library offers books for loan on a range of topics relating to spiritual life and psychotherapy. The collection includes general self-help, mindfulness and meditation, spirituality, grief, parenting, and children's books. It is located at our main office at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Hanover, in the waiting area.

Clinical research has determined that reading can enhance a person's mental health. It has been said that "reading is to the mind what exercise is to the body" (Addison and McNeeley). By engaging the mind and imagination, reading has been known to reduce stress and anxiety, and improve a



person's overall sense of well-being. In a recent study in England, researchers found that in less than 10 minutes of reading, individuals had slower heart rates, less muscle tension, and reduced stress levels.

Reading has been shown to slow the natural mental decline that comes with aging, reducing the rates and progression of dementia and Alzheimers. In addition to information and brain exercise, a good book can provide new perspective and learning about relationships by providing insight to the thinking and feelings of others, as well and one's own.

Lucy's Lending Library operates on an honor system. Please help yourself to a book of interest to you, and please return the book to the shelves when you're finished.

There is also a book-share spot in the waiting area at our Brockton site, First Evangelical Lutheran Church.

## Why PCSSS Is Important to Our Church *by Rev. Kevin Sparrow*

A few years ago, I completed a year-long Clinical Pastoral Education residency at a hospital near San Francisco. In C.P.E., ministers and other faith leaders offer pastoral and spiritual support to patients, functioning as hospital chaplains for patients and families in crisis or at end-of-life.

During my time, I served as a chaplain on a pediatric oncology floor and in the emergency department. I offered pastoral care through prayers and rituals as well as being someone to whom patients, family members, and hospital staff could talk. Many hospitals now include chaplains in a patient's care team along with doctors, nurses, and social workers.

My experience there was challenging but formative for me. It also convinced me of the vital need for accessible counseling services, outside of hospital settings, which incorporate spirituality and faith. Many patients expressed

their gratitude that they were able to speak with someone who could incorporate spirituality into their care. Yet, the majority of chaplains and ministers are not trained as counselors.

Pastoral Counseling Services of the South Shore serves a deep need in our community as many people nowadays are looking for ways to integrate their spirituality more deeply with their medical and mental health care. PCSSS staff are trained to work with a client's own spiritual perspective in the counseling experience. At St. Andrew's, we consider it part of our mission to the wider community to welcome the PCSSS main office and three-plus counseling spaces into our church. We are grateful for their ongoing presence with us and appreciate the collaboration we have formed.

## Training Program Expands & Continues

On January 26th, John McDargh Ph.D., retired core faculty at Boston College and retired adjunct faculty at William James College, led a remarkable training for PCSSS staff and therapists from around the South Shore.

In our largest Continuing Education event so far, Dr. McDargh explored ***The Psycho-Spiritual Implications of Working with Trauma***. His discussion addressed the importance of creating a sense of belonging in the treatment of trauma, particularly noting how trauma can compromise the ability and willingness to practice one's religious and spiritual core values.

His presentation was grounded in Ana-Maria Rizzuto's groundbreaking psychoanalytic study, *The Birth of the Living God*. Participants also benefited from hearing other clinicians share their own theoretical and clinical perspectives.

Due to unforeseen circumstances, our April training on ***Clinical Uses of the Enneagram*** had to be postponed until Saturday September 7 from 10 a.m. to noon. Presented by Deb Bellevue, clinician at The Well in Bridgewater, it will be held at our Plymouth location. Former PCSSS intern Steph Bronner LMHC, now a counselor at The Well, will be co-facilitating this seminar.

In this training, the co-facilitators will explore how this ancient personality assessment tool can improve self-awareness, understanding, and development regarding spiritual, psychological, and occupational questions. The training will offer Continuing Education credits (CEU's) for licensed therapists.

In addition to the Enneagram training, three additional CEU trainings are in preparation for Fall 2019 and Spring 2020, to be announced in the next newsletter.
